What you need to know before you go


- Portugal draws travellers with a mix of natural beauty and World Heritage sites. Its rugged, mountainous countryside and forested hills are dotted with Moorish castles and historical cities built around granite boulders. Down along the coastline, you'll find vibrant marine habitats, as well as stunning surfing beaches like the Algarve, with its swathes of golden dunes, amazing rock formations, and rock pools.
- Portugal's great cities like Lisbon and Porto welcome you with memorable sightseeing, be it down charming cobbled streets or through labyrinthine seaport waterways. Enjoy culinary adventures around 18th-century arcades and past mosaic squares in front of towering cathedrals. When night falls, be sure to head up to a popular hilltop district for hip partying. With its alluringly eclectic mix of experiences and attractions, Portugal ranks high on many bucket lists.





Lisbon

- Over the years, Lisbon has been home to the Celts, the Romans, and the Moors, and this rich heritage is still evident today in the city's captivating monuments, museums, and architecture. The great explorers da Gama and Magellan also set out from here on their global voyages of discovery. Visitors can explore the charming medieval neighborhood of Alfama, climb to Lisbon Castle for jaw-dropping views of the capital's hillsides, or take an old-fashioned tram around to enjoy the colorful city streets. Lisbon is also the only European capital on the Atlantic, and the beach is just a train ride away.

Porto

- In Porto, walk the stunning Dom Luis I bridge for incredible vistas, or catch a show at Boavista's remarkable Casa da Musica. In the Cedofeita neighborhood, choose from two exciting thoroughfares—the stylish Rua du Cedofeita and the trendy row of galleries and vintage shops known as Rua de Miguel Bombarda.
- Just south of central Porto, take a trip to the city of Vila Nova de Gaia and go on a tasting tour through the area's famous Port wine cellars. Or head to Povia de Varzim—or Espinho—for beachfront relaxation and casino thrills.

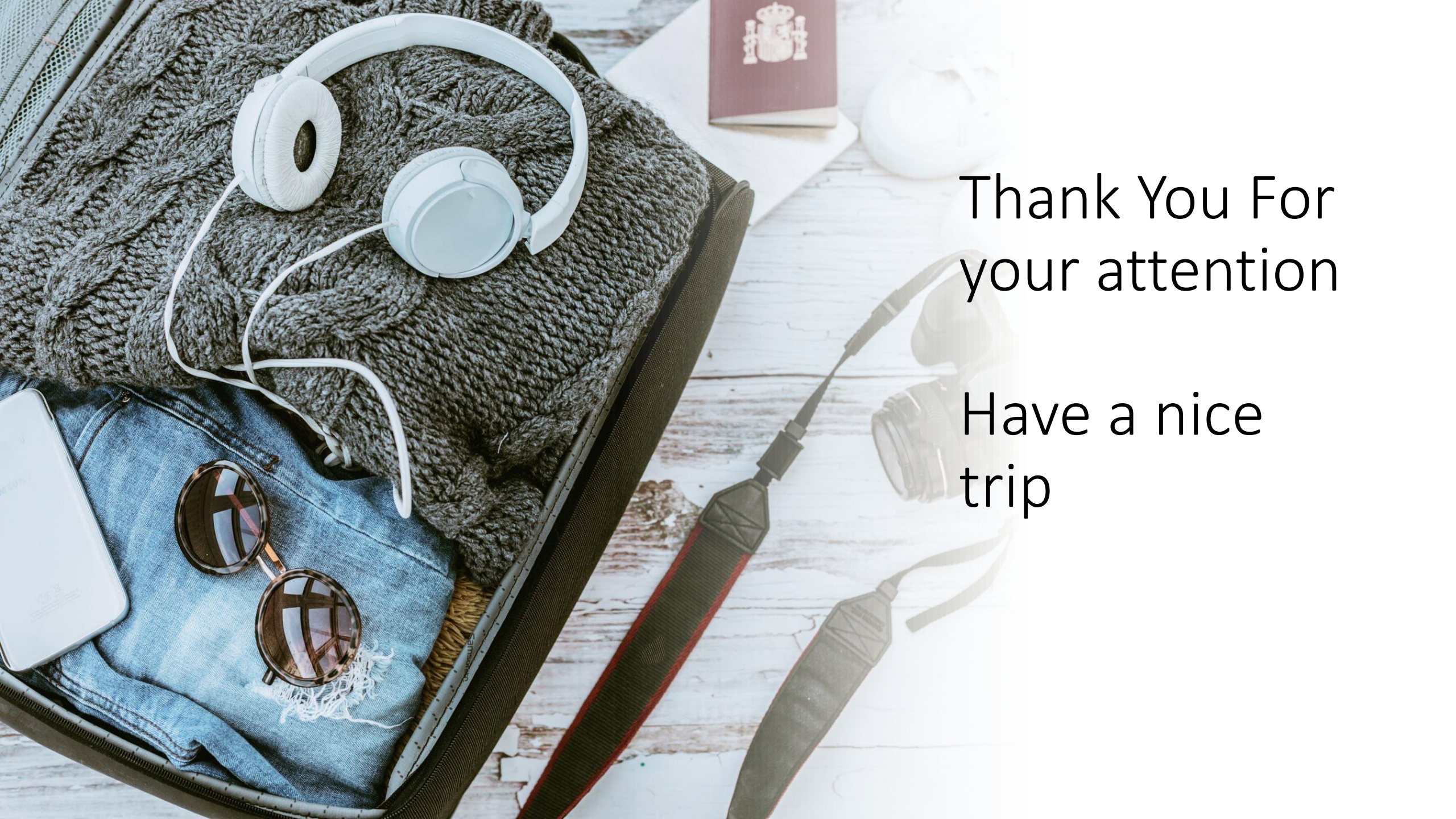


What to see & do in Porto

- Some of the best things to do in Porto showcase the city's rich history – you'll find one of the world's most famous port wine cellars, dozens of ancient churches, and world heritage sites. Its architecture is a mix of gothic, baroque and modernist styles, and the winding cobbled streets of Old Town give the city a unique charm.
- With such a diverse range of sights to see and things to do, it's no wonder Porto is fast becoming one of Western Europe's most respected tourist destinations. While you're here, try local dishes, view the iconic stately bridges, explore the characterful districts and treat yourself to some of the world's finest port wines to end your day. Here's our list of sights to see and things to do you should squeeze into your trip to Porto.

Madeira Island and it's attractions

- Madeira Island is the largest island on the 4-isle Madeira Archipelago, famed for its green, rugged, volcanic landscape with high cliffs, pebble beaches and delta river settlements. This is an outstanding spot for outdoor adventures like exploring the PR8 Verada da Ponta de São Lourenço headland with its rich flora and wildlife viewing opportunities. Adventurous types will also enjoy the climb to the peak of Pico Ruivo, the tallest mountain on the island, with breath-taking panoramic views of the entire island for miles in every direction.
- To soak up the local culture, visit the Farmers' Market, held in a historic venue in the heart of the settlement of Funchal. Here, you'll find fresh produce, arts and crafts. Also in Funchal is the CR7 Museu, a museum dedicated to the life and accomplishments of Portuguese footballer Cristiano Ronaldo. Golfers will want to shoot 18 holes at the championship-level course at Palheiro Golf resort. For a passionate, romantic excursion, take a trip to 25 Fontes Falls for its wealth of cascading waterfalls and bay forest surroundings.
